Found in Ephesians 1

In the first chapter of Ephesians we find a beautiful description of how much we are loved by our Heavenly Father. Sometimes we, especially women, feel overlooked, overanxious, over committed, overwhelmed, all kinds of other "overs".

In Ephesians 1:4 we read that God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, "chose us in Him before the foundation of the world." Talk about not being overlooked!


God chose us before the foundation of the world! The author, Paul, continues in verse 5, "In love He predestined us for adoption." These terms "chose" and "predestined" indicate a course of action that we had no part in planning. We were recipients of a gift that we didn't ask for or earn.

God predestined us in love (1:4), to the praise of His glorious grace (1:6), according to the riches of his grace, (1:7), according to His purpose (1:11), to the praise of His glory (1:12, 14).

We might be a little insulted that these reasons don't really have anything to do with us.

Didn't God choose me because He loved me? Well, yes. We know that from verse 4 and other passages like John 3:16. But there is a lot of comfort here too... "When God looks at you, He does not shrink back in horror and disgust. He sees a person of inestimable value and beauty..."





If God chose us in Him and there was nothing that we, the elect, could have done or will do, it means that nothing we do can change God's mind. It was made up before the foundation of the world.

What a relief!

When Paul describes God's attitude toward us in these verses, he uses language that is so exuberant and profuse. Look at verses 7–8: "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace, which He lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight..." The word "lavished" expresses so much. God gave us the riches of His grace in vast amounts or without limit.

As the hymn says, "How great the Father's love for us..." Since we have been adopted as sons, this means that we have an inheritance (verse 11)—our salvation.

But Paul also says we are God's inheritance (verse 18)!

The Ephesians were saved from the worship of capricious gods and goddesses so that they now belonged to the God of the universe. We may not have been rescued from this kind of background, but as Chapter 2 goes on to say, we were all dead in our trespasses and sins.

There was nothing beautiful about us when God set His sights on us for salvation and we became His inheritance.

"When God looks at you, He does not shrink back in horror and disgust. He sees a person of inestimable value and beauty. He loves you so much that He gave the costliest gift imaginable to obtain you as His own 'glorious' inheritance. You will be His cherished... daughter forever" (Zondervan Illustrated Bible Backgrounds Commentary, Vol 3, page 310).

Are you feeling overlooked? You are not! Are you feeling overanxious or over committed because you are trying to earn God's love? You don't have to feel this way because you belong to Him already—from the foundation of the world. Are you feeling overwhelmed? I hope that you are!

I hope you are feeling overwhelmed with how much God loves you.

ELDERFLOWER CORDIAL

A couple of days ago I was out for my walk and noticed some flowers that looked like elderflowers, except that they were growing like a lilac does, in a cone shape, instead of the flat heads of the usual black elders. I smelled them. They smelled like elderflower, so I took one home and looked it up.

Turns out, our native red elderflowers can be used to make elderflower cordial in the same way as the European variety. Right now they are flowering in Western Washington, in natural settings that are on the damp side. This morning I finished a batch of cordial that tastes very similar to the batch I made in Devon a couple of years ago.

Ingredients:

20 - 25 heads red
elderflowers

1 organic unwaxed
lemon

2T to 2 1/2T citric
acid
1 liter of water
5 cups sugar
Yields:
about 1 1/2 quarts



Directions:

- -Wash your lemon and peel the outside with a peeler.
- -Slice the lemon in 1/2 inch slices.
- -Combine lemons, peel, and flowers in a pyrex or large, heat-safe bowl.
- -Sprinkle citric acid over the flower and lemon mixture.
- -Make a thick simple syrup by warming sugar and water together in a pot over the stove, stirring until fully dissolved.
- -Bring syrup to boil and boil for one minute.
- -Pour the hot syrup over the the ingredients in a pyrex bowl, cover and leave to infuse overnight.
- -The next day, strain the mixture through a fine mesh colander (like the plastic one I use for kefir), or muslin into a 2 qt jar.
- -Pour into smaller, sterilized bottles. I use screw on or wire clasp bottles.

- -If you want your bottles to be shelf stable (not explode), pasteurize the bottles by putting a tea towel in the bottom of a large pot (6 8 qt) stand your sealed bottles on the towel and fill the pot with cold water.
- -Gradually bring the water to a simmer and simmer for 20 minutes.
- -Turn off heat and let all return to room temperature before removing bottles.
- -To serve, dilute 1 part cordial to 8 parts cold sparkling water.



Tips:

-Be sure to pick your elderflowers on a sunny day, in an area where the blossoms have not been polluted by vehicles. Rain washes away the pollen; this is where the flavor and scent is concentrated. -Use the flowers on the day that you pick them. -Warning! If you don't want your bottles to explode like mine did when I made this in 2018, they must either be refrigerated, frozen, or pasteurized. -I pasteurized some bottles and the process does alter the flavor. If you have room for a large bottle to live at the back of the fridge, it will taste fresher.

Be still, my soul: the Lord is on your side; bear patiently the cross of grief or pain; leave to your God to order and provide; in ev'ry change He faithful will remain. Be still, my soul: your best, your heav'nly Friend through thorny ways leads to a joyful end.

Be still, my soul: your God will undertake to guide the future as He has the past. Your hope, your confidence let nothing shake; all now mysterious shall be bright at last. Be still, my soul: the waves and winds still know His voice who ruled them while He dwelt below.

Be still, my soul: when dearest friends depart, and all is darkened in the vale of tears, then shall you better know His love, His heart, who comes to soothe your sorrow and your fears. Be still, my soul: your Jesus can repay from His own fullness all He takes away.

Be still, my soul: the hour is hast'ning on when we shall be forever with the Lord, when disappointment, grief, and fear are gone, sorrow forgot, love's purest joys restored. Be still, my soul: when change and tears are past, all safe and blessed we shall meet at last.



HYMNS OF FAITH

I grew up in the Deep South. My grandparents insisted I go with them to Sunday service in a little ship-lap church that had been a part of the community since the 1800's. Standing next to my grandmother I can remember opening a well-worn hymnal and hearing the trilling voices of old folks singing such tunes as "Onward Christian Soldiers" or "It is Well." In the dusty pew, I would cringe. The lack of fanfare, accompanying instruments, and my own inability to carry a tune convinced me that this ritual of singing hymns was plain ol' ugly and certainly not for me.

Years later, I've come to appreciate those seemingly boring, old hymns.

I have learned that hymns serve a vital role in both the communal worship of Christians and the daily life of the believer. Contemporary worship certainly has a place in the Christian's life, but hymns supply several unique purposes. Hymns are special.

First, we Christians have been singing hymns for centuries. When we sing the hymns of old, we are drawing our hearts back to the great testimonies of faith that have been forged by saints before us. Secondly, hymns are styled to be sung in community. There are Christians today who worship together in secret rooms under the crushing weight of totalitarian regimes. Think of the comfort they might experience as they collectively sing the words to hymns such as "It Is Well With My Soul."

Hymns also instruct us how to have practical theology. Meaning, hymns inform us about the character of God and teach us how to live in light of that knowledge.

Consider the great hymn "Be Still My Soul." Originally penned in German by Katherina Von Schlegel in the 18th century, this hymn paints the picture of a God who cares intimately for His people. The first stanza of the song states "Be still, my soul: the Lord is on your side; bear patiently the cross of grief or pain."

These lyrics are theologically profound; the author affirms the truth that we Christians will face hardship in our life. "Bear patiently the cross of grief or pain" encourages the Christian to think rightly about suffering; we are encouraged not to conceal ourselves from pain. Neither are we to pretend that pain does not impact us- our bodies, our hearts, our souls.

Rather, we are to endure suffering and pain by having an eternal perspective. This eternal perspective is only made possible through Christ. Jesus Christ's death on the cross secured reconciliation between us and God the Father.

As we bear patiently the hurts in our life, we remember that the Lord has promised His people painless safety in eternal communion with Him.

With that being said, pain was a mainstay of life even before the current Coronavirus pandemic came to pass. But oh, how much more does this viral scourge cause us to feel the sting of this reality.

Reflecting back to the hymn "Be Still My Soul," the author sends us a gold nugget of hope for such a time as this: "Be still, my soul: when dearest friends depart, and all is darkened in the vale of tears, then shall you better know His love, His heart, who comes to soothe your sorrow and your fears."

We all live in a vale of tears.

What is your vale of tears? Perhaps you are quarantined alone. Maybe you have recently watched loved ones die. Maybe you are reading this in the wee hours of the morning, dreading the moment when your little ones wake up demanding your attention. Sister, remember how sweet communion with the Lord can taste when we see His face and His promises amidst our pain. He soothes us when we are sad and afraid.

I really don't know how to carry a tune. Even still, the importance of singing hymns is not lost on me. Hymns don't forfeit their communal, historical, or theological significance because I can't sing. My lack of musical ability simply allows for a greater opportunity of reflection and to ponder the areas of my life where I need soothing. Sister, what hymns are you reflecting on during this time?

Where do you need Christ to soothe you?




Have you heard about the Friendship Circles that the Women's Ministry of Faith has established for the women in the church?
